From the Governor's Desk:

61 Days Left

We have 61 days to complete our goals. We have only 61 days left until the end of the "LOVE Optimist Year" where we in Indiana South are "Targeting the Hearts" of kids.

We only have 61 days left to complete the 15 New Optimist Clubs that we have "Targeted". Over 40 members stood in front of Optimist International President Ronnie Dunn and committed to build over 22 new Clubs this year. While we may not complete 22 or even 15 new Clubs, we CAN still complete the 6 Clubs that have been started. It takes about 6 weeks (42 days) to get a new Optimist Club organized. So you still have plenty of time to make a call to a friend, go visit his/her town and recruit their friends. Last year's record of 174 new clubs for OI was achieved with 80 Clubs completed in September.

We have 61 days left to complete the 20 JOOI Clubs that we planned. We have one JOOI Club so far by Indianapolis Breakfast. We had two ready to organize with the start of school in Columbus and Evansville. If you really want to help kids to help other kids, contact your school superintendent to find out what you must do to get clearance to get into the schools and who you might contact to be an Advisor. Once you let the kids know the Club is available, they will jump on it.

And, if I haven't mentioned it yet, we only have 61 days to add more than 70 members that the District is below our October 1 base. We have 20 Clubs that are below their Oct. 1 base. If each one of them would host a NOW (New Optimists

Welcomed) event in the next month, and signed at least 5 members each, we all will be Honor Clubs.

Thank you all for helping make this TARGET THEIR HEARTS year a great year so far. But we still have 61 days until September 30, to reach our kids in JOOI Clubs, new members for your Club and new Optimist Clubs in the next town where kids are waiting.

We cannot Bring Out The Best In Kids until we bring out the best in ourselves.

See you on August 17 and 18 at our Convention in Evansville.

ZONE 8 INVITES YOU TO THE 21st ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE INDIANA SOUTH DISTRICT – OPTIMIST INTERNATIONAL

The members of the Zone 8 Optimist Clubs are looking forward to hosting the Convention to be held on August 16 – 19, 2007. The Convention will be held downtown at the Executive Inn, located at the corners Walnut Street and Martin Luther King Boulevard.

There are many things to see and do while visiting Evansville.

- Take your children, or grandchildren, to see cMoe, Children's Museum of Evansville. You may go to <u>www.cMoeKids.org</u> for more information.
- The Reitz Home Museum is in the downtown area. This Victorian era historic mansion has been restored and renovated to the time of the late 1800s. The home is an example of French Second Empire architecture. Go to, www.ReitzHome.Evansville.net.
- Angel Mounds State Historic Site is located on the eastside of Evansville near the river. The regional center and chiefdom for a community of thousands of people of the Middle Mississippian culture from 1100 to 1450 A.D. This site is recognized as one of the best-preserved prehistoric Native American sites in the United States. Go to www.angelMounds.org.
- Bosse Field opened in 1915 and was the first municipally owned sports facility in the United States. Only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) are older than Evansville's Bosse Field. Bosse Field is currently the home of the Evansville Otters, winners of the Frontier League championship in 2006.
- Just across the river, just south of Ellis Park racetrack, is John James Audubon State Park and Museum. The Museum interprets James', the famed naturalist, life through his original works and personal memorabilia.
- Casino Aztar is located downtown. The hotel shuttle runs 24/7 to the airport and the Casino.
- Wesselman Woods Nature Preserve has over 190 acres of virgin bottomland hardwood forest, 50 acres of younger forest, fields, ponds, nature trails and Nature Center exhibits. This is the largest Nature Preserve located within a city in Indiana. Adjacent to the parks are tennis courts, softball fields, batting cages, and picnic areas, golf course and handicapped accessible playground.

As you can see, there are plenty of things for the kids to do while visiting Evansville.

Breakfast Optimist Club of Terre Haute, Indiana

Last Thursday we provided \$600 to the 14th and Chestnut Community Center for the purchase of back to school shoes for impoverished kids. We also provided \$600 each worth of "back to school supplies" for Ryves Hall (a division of Catholic Charities) and for the Salvation Army. Vigo County has the highest percentage of kids living in poverty in the state so this is a very worthwhile program here.

The previous week we provided a \$50 check to Big Brothers/Big Sisters of The Wabash Valley. On June 28 we provided \$1,000 to sponsor 9 kids at the Respect for Law Camp in Vincennes. On June 21 we provided \$50 check to Junior Achievement of the Wabash Valley. And on June 18 we are funded \$300 to sponsor a four member golf team in the Miss Crossroads to America Golf Scramble. Miss Crossroads to America sponsors and supports teenage girls to train for the Miss Indiana Pageant and ultimately the Miss America Pageant. Our club secretary, Jenilee Hooker, is a former Miss Indiana State University and Miss Indiana contestant.

Finally, coming up on in late August we've budgeted \$1,500 to sponsor kids to attend the Junior Police Academy.

- o Need addressed Need a recognition for academic achievement (Now for those of you who do not know me...l promote youth sports, too but we recognized a need to focus on academics.)
- o Approximate number of members to do project 12-15
- o Estimated amount of money to do project \$600
- o Cost to attendees: \$0
- o Why YOU consider it your favorite service-to-youth project In our area, many banquets are held to recognize athletic achievement...few are purely to recognize academic achievement. This project gives us an avenue to congratulate the top ten academic seniors, recognize educators who have made a positive impact on our youth, and bring the seniors families into the recognition program to thank them for their support of our youth...who will ultimately be our leaders.

Cemetery Restoration

Great things happened when we combined the strengths and talents of a community group dedicated to restoration of pioneer cemeteries, the Mill Creek Optimist Club, and the Cadet Jr. Optimist Club! The pictures below show the beginning and end of two phases of the restoration of a small, local cemetery.

Phase I – clearing of the brush and dead trees from an old, untended cemetery - was accomplished by members of the Mill Creek Optimist Club and community members representing the Hendricks County Indiana Pioneer Cemeteries Restoration Project (pictures 1&2). Phase II – cleaning, repairing, and resetting stones was spearheaded by the Cadet Jr. Optimist Club in cooperation with the Mill Creek Optimist Club and the Pioneer Cemeteries Restoration Project (pictures 3-5).

Arrangements for access, restoration research and processes, materials, etc. were all provided by the Pioneer Cemeteries Restoration Project chaired by Jessica Felix... the Optimists provided their hands-on, can-do attitude and talents to make a difference in the community! Need a Fundraiser


